Patterns

Santa used lots of different patterned wrapping paper in our 'Dear Santa' story.

Salt dough decorations



- L. Make your salt dough

You can make your letters to Santa as decorative as you wish.. You could even cut out pictures from catalogues of your Christmas wishes and glue them onto your paper.



Developing early writing skills




Ask an adult to write your name on a piece of paper. Use a cotton bud or use your finger to paint, following the lines and creating your name using spots.
